




# **Easson guide: What are the unwritten rules?**

Discover the social contracts that exist in our lives and bring awareness to their role and the values that underpin them.



Grounding exercises help us be present in the moment, refocus our attention and manage anxiety by helping our mind to relax.

- 5 things you see
- 4 things you can touch
- 3 things you hear
- 2 things you smell
- 1 thing you feel





I Split – You Pick: A parenting strategy (to manage fighting siblings):

Scenario: There is one cookie left in the tin, you are arguing over it with your two siblings. You are told to share the cookie, you get to split the cookie but you are the last to select the piece you can eat.

Discuss:

- How do you split the cookie and why?
- What does that tell you about unwritten rules in our society?



### Groups of 4



Contracts are everywhere: Marriage, citizenship, employment.

In many societies our social contracts involve giving up certain freedoms for protection (E.g, law and health care).

We also have reciprocal unwritten contracts in our relationships. In groups of 4 share:

The unwritten rules of your family or friendship groups.

- What freedoms do you surrender for your social contracts?
- What are the limitations of our social contracts?

- Collate the group responses for each question.
- As a class vote on the top responses to keep for each question.
- For each question, decide the values that underpin the response, use the list to help.



This lesson was co-created with youth, educators and topic experts from around the world.

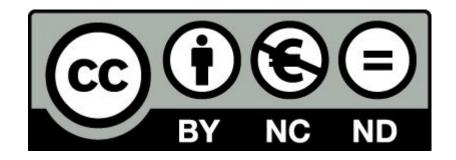
