

## <u>Lesson Plan – Where do values show up?</u>

**Purpose**: Explore the connectivity between morals, ethics and values, applying ethical reasoning when making decisions.

**Equipment needed**: Pen, paper, computer, projector.

**Lesson timings** (50 minutes): The timings are just a guide. The lesson can be delivered as a whole, in sections, or if there is a rich discussion in one section, take the time and allow that to develop.

Lesson structure	Lesson Content	Resources / Comments
Class Environment 5C Slide	Share the 5C's of the CfL classroom to create a respectful, safe atmosphere and to build trust with each other.  Together we are growing a creative, critical, caring, collaborative environment where positive, supportive communication is developed through listening, sharing and building on ideas.	Remind learners how a classroom that explores CfL topics needs to look, feel and sound.
Check-In Whole Group (5 mins) Are you Present?	This video presents a 2 minute meditation. Practising meditation on a regular basis, helps address the discomfort that some students have with this practice when they start out.	The video transcript is in the slide notes.
Warm-Up Groups of 4 (5 mins)  Distinguish ethics, morals and values	<ol> <li>Learners arrange into friendship pairs and then pairs get into groups of 4.</li> <li>In their groups learners use the picture on the slide to craft board definitions of ethics, morals and values.</li> <li>Learners use the definitions of 3 forms of morality to match up the pictures with the definitions.</li> </ol>	There is additional guidance on how to define these to support learners.  Answers to the 'What are morals' slide are in the slide notes.
Main Activity Groups of 4 (30 mins)  Morals and Values	<ol> <li>Activity Preparation demonstrates the relationship between moral judgements and our values.</li> <li>In groups of 4</li> <li>Learners identify the values that lie behind each moral judgement statement.</li> <li>Introduce moral dilemmas and learners discuss the moral dilemma statements.</li> </ol>	The life skills here include critical thinking, perspective taking and decision-making.  Additional guidance on these statements are provided on the slide notes.



	3 moral dilemmas are shown, feel free to use 1, 2 or 3 of them.  4. Learners are presented with 2 moral dilemmas. For each dilemma they discuss what they would do and
	why.
Reflection	Continuing in Groups of 4 learners:
Groups of 4 (10 mins)	<ol> <li>Use the prompting questions on the slide to discuss the purpose of exploring moral dilemmas.</li> </ol>
Why do we study moral dilemmas?	Learners will bring an awareness to the values that support the decisions they make in their moral dilemmas.
	<ol> <li>Watch the video on ethical decision-making and pause for each of the reflection questions providing time for the groups to respond to them.</li> </ol>
